The Community Trust Index

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An evidence-based tool for measuring and fostering trust in humanitarian action

Community trust is essential for effective humanitarian action, serving as the foundation for access, collaboration, and resilience.

Declining trust can hinder access, increase security risks, and create inefficiencies. Trust is complex and multi-dimensional, influenced by social, economic, cultural, and environmental factors. It must be actively earned, yet organisations and programmes often assume rather than measure community trust and may gain or lose this without a clear understanding of why.



The Community Trust Index provides organizations and programmes the means to:

MEASURE community trust and the factors influencing this trust.

effectiveness in providing assistance.


UNDERSTAND AND TRACK trust over time, and compare how community trust differs geographically

or between different groups of people.

DEVELOP

informed actions for fostering community trust in humanitarian action.


It can be used by individual or interagency collectives of organisations, before, during, and/or after disasters, crises, and outbreaks.



Mixed methods tools combine **standardised household surveys** with adjustable **qualitative questions** for measuring and exploring trust with communities against these dimensions and sub-dimensions.



The findings from using Trust Index can be presented visually, clearly highlights gaps and areas requiring further action.



For example, in the above data from Mongolian Red Cross Society, community trust is high, largely due to the organization's timely support, understanding of needs, and non-discriminatory assistance. However, slightly low transparency suggests this is an area the organisation needs to strengthen.

The Community Trust Index has been spearheaded by IFRC's Community Engagement and Accountability (CEA) team. Its development in 2022–2023 involved:

- A **review** of existing literature **to inform** the index*.
- Cognitive **interview** with communities in Argentina, Azerbaijan, and Sudan **to refine** the data collection tools.
- **Pilots** in 8 countries (Argentina, Ecuador, Mongolia, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Tuvalu) to further test and refine the methodology.

In 2024, a Technical Advisory Group was formed to provide strategic guidance on trust to the Community Trust Index core team at the IFRC Secretariat. The group includes representatives from the Edelman Trust Institute, World Health Organization, Internews, Ground Truth Solutions, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Solferino Academy, Common Thread, Global Network of People Living with HIV (GNP+), the Global Migration Lab and others.
